William Shakespeare once said "some are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them". In life however, we cannot always count on being born great, or having greatness thrust upon us, but we must always remember that the opportunity to achieve greatness is within our grasp.

I have found that the harder I worked, the more luck I seemed to have. And it was with utmost patience and endurance that entitled me to become what I am today...a gold medalist. My journey here at Don Bosco University in the beautiful campus of Tapesia, was profound. It was enlightenment in its best form. And it transformed me, for good.

In retrospect, I've tried to recapitulate the same with utmost justice to the people involved and to the teachings they tried to inculcate in me over the last 2 years.


