INTERACTIVE TEACHING A FacultyEnrichment Programme

A Faculty Enrichment Programme on 'Interactive Teaching' for the faculty of DBCET was held on 3-4 September 2010, conducted by Fr. Abraham Vettikal from Chennai. The main objective of this programme was to set the stage for the establishment of a sense of urgency in using interactive experimental training strategies. The concept of 'constructivism' was explained as the process which is more subtle than simple and whose power is pervasive. Fr. Vettikal explained the use of language and its contribution to bring about desired changes. The faculty members were trained in the use of various interactive instructional activities like action learning, case method, instructional puzzles, scenario, educational software etc.

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The programme encouraged the implementation of some specific strategies to foster interaction during a lecture, such as the use of stories, personal anecdotes, headline news and interesting stories about celebrated scholars within the discipline. Fr. Vettikal said that such strategies can enliven the lecture materials for the students and therefore help them to feel more personally connected with the subject matter. He instructed the group to encourage students to respond to questions and to allot enough time for them to frame their answers to the questions raised.

Participatory lecture formats and think-pair-share were among the other strategies discussed. Fr. Vettikal spoke of the importance of using ICT (information and Communication Technologies) to create meaningful connections engaging all. He underlined the need for using media and technology to work and learn together.

The entire programme was aimed at creating awareness for creating a interactive atmosphere during the teaching-learning process. To convince the faculty about the importance of interactive teaching, Fr. Vettikal kept repeating one of the sayings of Barbara H. Carson, "Students learn what they care about, from people they care about, and who they know care about them".

Small Scale Business for Economic Prosperity Summer Training with MDF

This year's Summer Training with Mushroom Development Foundation (MDF) gave Sanjib, Karbom, Phiba and Rupankar a wonderful opportunity to take up projects on developing the market for mushroom and its distribution network together with developing the backward integration and the branding of mushroom products. They learnt much about the wonderful work that is practically changing the outlook of the people in some areas of the region.

MDF is actively working on locations like Sonapur, Makum, etc, and areas within its vicinity. It is now working on expanding their services throughout the length and breadth of North Eastern region. Mr. Pranjal Baruah, the founder and General Secretary of the foundation, says that the trained farmers are working well even and in spite of drought conditions. MDF's future plans are to bring fresh mushrooms into a point of sale wherein it will be packed and distributed under the brand name "Mushfill" which itself will form a separate company.

Mushroom, with its medicinal and nutritional attributes, is a good source of protein supply for the human body. The market for mushrooms continues to grow especially due to its culinary, nutritional, and health benefits. It is a completely vegetarian food and its prevalent uses in various dishes have set up the platform in the bottom of the pyramid, particularly among the farming populace for its cultivation. One of the major limiting factors that are restraining the local market of mushroom to prosper is the demand-supply reciprocation.

Ironically, today most of the popular restaurants, hotels and retail outlets are using tinned mushrooms instead of using fresh mushrooms cultivated by local producers. It is merely because the local producers are not potent enough to meet the demands. Some of the highlighted factors that are restraining the local producers are- lack of awareness among the farmers, delay in the timely supply of spawn, shortcomings in cleanliness and tidiness of the mushroom huts, etc.

It is in this context that some of the organizations have come up to better the local market in a holistic manner. One among those is MDF which has been working over a decade. Since its inception in 1994, MDF has tried to encourage the rural farmers to get into this occupation. As a part of their initiatives, they are trying to build up the capacity of the farmers by providing them adequate training, supplying the farmers with spawns, setting up mushroom huts etc. The primary vision and mission of the foundation is to alleviate poverty among the marginal farmers and make them economically vibrant.

Their experience with MDF has been very inspiring and rewarding.

BEGINNING OF A NEW JOURNEY



It was 28 June 2010, when I, first entered the gates of DBIM (Don

The whole exercise was quite exhilarating and it really helped in breaking the ice.

After having all the fun lessons, we were ushered in to the Saraighat hall where, Fr. V.M. Thomas, together with his motivational talk, explained the various facets of the whole programme and what is expected from the students. The faculty also interacted with us on various topics, and the DBIM hostel management team gave us a preview of the hostel life.

After dinner at the canteen, we were led by the senior students to our respective hostels. Three other girls were assigned to my room. Our parents had to leave, which made us sad but at the same time, we were all thrilled to start a new life. That's how our new hostel world started.

Now, almost three months have passed in DBIM, with lots of mixed experiences and full of learning. After coming to DBIM, I have taken up the habit of going for morning jogging. With the Hostel Warden, who was later on joined by the Hostel Superintendant, all the DBIM Hostellers go for a morning jogging cum brisk walk, in the morning hours, enjoying the free healthy air. This morning activity (though it seems a heavy-duty activity for some) is very helpful for us, for it helps us to keep our mind and body fresh to tackle the challenges of the day.

After breakfast, the students come for the Morning Assembly. For me and for most of my friends, this is one of the most important activities, held at 9 o' clock sharp, every working day, where the morning prayers are offered, presided over by the Rector. Normally, important incidents, both internal and external, are intimated at the gathering. Important persons and guests are acknowledged and their relation with DBIM gets strengthened. We, the students also get the invaluable opportunity to reflect on the previous day's learning and thoughts, and deliver it in the form of short speeches and talks – a healthy practice that will stand us in good stead in the years to come.

The classes begin from ninetwenty, after the Assembly. The class activities start with case studies, understanding of the various problems through supportive knowledge, unannounced tests and quizzes, theoretical and practical assignments and other class works. This may seem to be a lot of daily work, and actually it is, but with the help of the faculty, who are always co-operative and helpful, all these are done within the stipulated time-frame.

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One of the most important parts of the DBIM culture is helping the poor students of society through an initiative called, 'Prajjwal'. The voluntary members of this forum are the students of DBIM. They gather together, every Sunday, the small children of the nearest village, Joypur, to teach them literacy, hygiene and other social skills. It is a philanthropic activity, being carried out under the guidance of the Rector and Mr. Bikash Gogoi, faculty, DBIM. Apart from studies, the children are also engaged in extracurricular activities viz., poem recitation, singing and dancing. We all feel very privileged to be a part of the wonderful forum, 'Prajjwal', because it gives us real satisfaction to help and teach these children in need.

Two months ago, while travelling in the States, I had a unique experience that kept me amused, and thinking for quite some time... an inspiration, an insight, an 'Ah Ha! Moment' as the management gurus call it...

I was to catch a flight from Providence in Rhode Island to New York, a connecting flight for the return journey to Delhi. After sitting in the aircraft for over an hour on the tarmac, we were told that the flight was cancelled due to technical problems.

Back at the terminal again, we formed a long queue at the check-in counter to look for alternate arrangements. The two clerks at the counter, a man and a woman, were having a harrowing time trying to solve each traveller's peculiar needs and making fresh reservations for over a hundred passengers – a tedious and, inevitably, a slow task.

I was about the 9th or 10th in the line. It was about an hour before I reached the top of the queue. Just then, a gentleman, from somewhere far down the line, suddenly pushed his way to the front, all fuming and fretting, and loudly demanding that he be given immediately a first class ticket to wherever he wanted to go.

The attendant, very coolly professional in his approach, said, "I'm sorry, Sir - but you will have to wait your turn. All these people are ahead of you in the line." That only made matters worse – the man pounded his fist on the counter and shouted, **"Do you have any idea who I am?"**

That's when it happened... the 'Ah Ha!

Moment' ...

The other attendant at the counter, the lady, picked up the mike for the public address system and announced (for everyone to hear), "Attention please. There is a gentleman here at the ticket counter who does not know who he is. If there is anyone in the airport who can identify him, please come to the counter."

Crestfallen and humiliated, the man sheepishly walked back to his place in the queue... There was applause, heads were shaking in agreement, and suddenly it did not seem such a long wait in the queue anymore...

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These days, as the new academic session started, news bulletins on the television carry every now and then some shocking cases of 'ragging' across the country – most of the time highlighting stories of mindless brutality and depravity perpetrated on the 'juniors' by those who consider themselves their 'seniors'.

The underlying idea is always the same – these 'juniors' must be taught humility; they must understand 'their place' in the hierarchy; they must learn to respect the 'alpha specimens' in the college or the university...
