Setting up of 'Centre for Distance Education'

A joint Inspection Team of Distance Education Council of India (DEC), University Grants Commission (UGC) and All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) visited the college on 9th December to verify the preparedness of the University to start Distance Education under the newly created 'Centre for Distance Education'.

The team was chaired by Prof Latha Pillai (Pro Vice Chancellor of Indira Gandhi National Open University, New Delhi) with Prof Altaf Khan of Jamia Milia University representing AICTE, Prof Karmeshu of Jawaharlal Nehru University representing the UGC, Prof Kamal Yadav representing DEC, and Dr R R Rausaria (Director, DEC) as the Coordinator of the visit.

The team found the University well prepared starting distance education programmes. Official communication from the Distance Education Council is expected in January after the meeting of their Executive Council.

Don Bosco University, India, Launches Seven Online Degree Courses

GUWAHATI, Assam (SAR NEWS) —Don Bosco university in the northeast Indian state of Assam is offering global access to its degree courses in seven programmes in three disciplines. Claiming to be the first of its kind in the country, Assam Don Bosco University based in Guwahati, already in its third year, is all set to launch its first online programmes.

"We hope to target thousands of working-class young people across the globe," says the Vice-Chancellor of the University, Dr. Stephen Mavely SDB, explaining how the classes and study will take place on the Web, enabling students to have access to the best professors from around the country.

Using state-of-the-art Virtual Classroom Technology, the varsity will run the programmes designed for working executives and professionals looking for study projects that complement their work and their need to juggle a career, a family and professional advancement studies.

These programmes give an option for anyone anywhere to be part of Don Bosco University (DBU) backed by its worldwide network in education and other developmental works. Currently Don Bosco Society operates in 132 countries.

The DBU OnLine programme director, Dr. Joseph Anikuzhikkattil, says, "From this year, we are offering study programmes in the following subjects: Executive MBA (1 year), MBA in Information Technology (2 years), MBA in Entrepre-

neurship (2 years), MBA with Specialisation (2 years), MS (Information Technology) (2 years), Bachelor of Business Administration (3 years) and Bachelor of Computer Applications (3 years)."

Programme coordinator, Arnab Kumar Choudhury, adds: "This will be followed by many more degree/diploma/certificate programmes in a modular structure in quick succession."

Currently, DBU conducts regular degree courses in Management, Engineering, Information Technology and Computer Applications from Don Bosco College of Engineering and Technology at Azara and Don Bosco Institute of Management at Kharguli, Guwahati.

Construction work on the 272-acre main campus at Tapesia Gardens, 16 km from state capital Dispur, is to commence shortly. Within three to five years, the DBU main campus residential complex is expected to house some six thousand students and staff. Besides the academic and administrative complex, the campus will also maintain a tea plantation, and have such facilities as a sports complex, chapel, convention centre, hospital facilities, bio-diversity park as well as a high school for one thousand under-privileged students.

DBCET organized a Workshop on SCILAB and SPOKEN TUTO-RIALS on 7-8 December 2010 with the aim of increasing awareness about the availability and benefits of SCILAB both at the academic and research levels. The programme aimed at setting up a SCILAB User Group at Guwahati that can assist SCILAB users in troubleshooting and to build up resource centres in the region for providing expertise in the deployment of software under Free and Open Source Software for Science and Engineering Education (FOSSEE). Faculty members from GMIT, Guwahati, Rangia College, St. Anthony's College, Shillong, and DBCET participated in the two-day workshop.

Prof Kannan Moudgalya, IIT Bombay, member of the SCILAB Consortium's Scientific Board generously initiated and guided the workshop, funded by the MHRD; and, Fr. Joseph Nellanatt, Pro VC, DBU, was the driving force behind the organization and success of the programme.

Prof. C.S. Kumar, Associate Professor in the department of Mechanical Engineering, IIT Kharagpur, and Ms. Nancy Varkey, IIT Bombay who is coordinating the efforts for the creation of spoken tutorials, were among the resource persons of the workshop.

The first day's sessions on 'Virtual Lab' helped the participants to understand the use of SCILAB and its importance. The second day was dedicated to 'Spoken Tutorials', dealing with the preparation and usefulness of tutorials with screencast and nar-

ration fora computer based activities. The workshop was made interesting as each of the participants had to create his/her own piece of tutorial. The group was also given inputs on the technicalities of dubbing them into other Indian languages.

Mr. Ranjay Das, one of the participants, commented, "The workshop was unique in its concept of spreading the message across the nation as it aimed at imparting education to all sections of people. The point was made very clear by the resource persons as they encouraged the group to imagine and prepare a lesson for a working girl child in a remote village at midnight trying to learn with the help of free and open source software and the spoken tutorials."

SCILAB is an open source, cross-platform numerical computational package and a high-level, numerically oriented programming language. It can be used for signal processing, statistical analysis, image enhancement, fluid dynamics simulations, numerical optimization, and modeling and simulation of explicit and implicit dynamical systems. The SCILAB Consortium is involved in the Open Source world in multifarious ways.

The Spoken Tutorial project is the initiative of the 'Talk to a Teacher' activity of the National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NMEICT), launched by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India.

SOCIAL COMMITMENT

We have taken part in different types of social commitment activities during this year. The activities ranged from cleaning the campus to organising weekly remedial classes for children from the college neighbourhood. These activities have been wonderful experiences for all of us in many ways.

An eye-opener

These social commitment activities have made us come face to face with realities we were not aware of, or if aware of only vaguely. Most of us have lived our lives insulated from problems and most often we have received the best of facilities. The social commitment programme made us realise that there are people around us who are deprived even of the basic necessities of life.

The MCA1 students visited Jangakhuli Auchalik High School, near Boko. As Manik Halam, a student of MCA1 writes, "We came to realise that there are schools having very poor infrastructure with children deprived even of fundamental education."

The ECE3B students visited the orphanage managed by the Missionaries of Charity at Baralumukh. Bijit Bordoloi, their class representative had this to say about the experience: "I saw that almost all the orphans were babies. Only a person who visits them can feel the deep pain of being orphaned or abandoned. At that age, children need love and care and the people in the society should realise it at the earliest. This experience has entirely changed my attitude towards little orphans".

I believe that these interactions have been eye-openers in more ways than one. Not only have they opened our eyes, they have also opened the eyes of those we interacted with – they would have realised that there are people who care for them.

We Can Make a Change

As we took part in the Social commitment programmes, a new confidence dawned on us – We can make a change. The change may not be great and it may not affect very many people - but we can bring about a change for the better in the lives of those we come into contact with.

CSE3 and EEE3 conducted regular coaching classes for poor children in the neighbourhood of the college. The children came in large numbers Sunday after Sunday, telling us that our efforts were appreciated and that we had made a difference.

Swagata Singha Roy, student of EEE3 says, "It was indeed a great experience. We got the opportunity to interact with the children of the locality as well as to support them in their studies. We feel that it made a difference in their lives."

The EEE5 students took up the challenge of cleaning up the surroundings of the college. They divided themselves into groups and cleaned different parts of the college. Arpit

Bringing Joy

Realisation that we can bring joy into the lives of others was a joy in itself. When the ECE3A students visited the orphanage, this was their experience, as Shikhamoni Kalita decribes – "In the orphanage, we tried to make them forget their problems for a while. We also realised that sharing what we have — our time, our love with others brought us joy and a feeling of fulfilment. Zeba Samshi belongs to CSE3, a class which helped in the Sunday coaching programme. She realised that, "Sharing our knowledge with others has increased our appreciation of the knowledge that we have. It brought happiness, fulfilment and self-confidence to us."

ECE5 students spent a Sunday with the old people at the old people's home run by the Missionaries of Charity at Lankeswar. They summed up their experience in these words: "The people there were touched by our interaction with them and we in turn enjoyed the time we spent with them."

Our Duty Towards Society


