From the Desk of the Vice-Chancellor

The United Nations formally launched a new initiative called 'Academic Impact' at a two-day conference in New York City, November 18-19, 2010, in an effort to bolster "intellectual social responsibility" for such global goals as promoting human rights, protecting the environment and ending wars. This initiative was aimed at partnering with institutions of higher learning around the world to actively support 10 universally accepted principles in the areas of human rights, literacy, sustainability and conflict resolution, all of which are based on the United Nations Charter, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Millennium Development Goals.

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Academic Impact is informed by a commitment to support and advance ten basic principles:

- 1. A commitment to the principles inherent in the United Nations Charter as values that education seeks to promote and help fulfil;
- 2. A commitment to human rights, among them freedom of inquiry, opinion, and speech;
- 3. A commitment to educational opportunity for all people regardless of gender, race, religion or ethnicity;
- 4. A commitment to the opportunity for every interested individual to acquire the skills and knowledge necessary for the pursuit of higher education;
- 5. A commitment to building capacity in higher education systems across the world;
- 6. A commitment to encouraging global citizenship through education;
- 7. A commitment to advancing peace and conflict resolution through education;
- 8. A commitment to addressing issues of poverty through education;
- 9. A commitment to promoting sustainability through education;
- 10. A commitment to promoting inter-cultural dialogue and understanding, and the "unlearning" of intolerance, through education.

Each participating college or university is expected to engage in one activity or project annually in support of these principles. By formally endorsing the ten principles in the Academic Impact, institutions make a commitment to use education as an engine for addressing global problems.

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Don Bosco University has signed up to be a participating university in this initiative with the belief that the next generation must be given the skill sets to solve global problems, that young people must learn to understand that two people in different parts of the world could see the same thing differently and both could still be right; and with the belief



that the next generation must be brought up with the ability to understand that you have to look for solutions to problems by looking at them also through the eyes of others and that you don't own the answers exclusively.

In consonance with this undertaking, the University is embarking on a number of projects this year:

- 1. Starting a PG Diploma programme in Human Rights with special emphasis on Child Rights with the aim of empowering social workers, NGOs, lawyers and others with the tools to be effective in their work;
- 2. Starting a Post Graduate Programme and research in Social Work (MSW) with a strong component of practical field work and research to enable our graduates to become committed agents of social change;
- 3. Starting a Department of North-East India Studies with the express aim of promoting, studying, celebrating and researching into the mosaic of cultures, languages, tribes and ethnic religions of this unique part of the world; and,
- 4. Setting up Solar Plant to produce 100 KWs of electricity for use in the campus and to feed the excess to the national grid as a pilot project in the popularization of renewable sources of energy.

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By signing up for UN Academic Impact, Don Bosco University intends to contribute to and benefit from the pooling of ideas and sharing of best practices with some of the most involved and innovative institutions of higher education from all over the globe... and in doing so, the University seeks to make itself, as envisaged in the concept paper of the University, a centre for culture, knowledge, research, intellectual ferment, for critical thinking and analysis of whatever shapes and impacts human life with a conscious intent to influence thinking, planning, and policy making on vital aspects of social life : religion, culture, society, politics, governance, education, environment, health care...
